THE VALUE OF GOSPEL TRACTS

Editors Note: This article was adapted from a sermon by Alex B. Coloma of the Guam Church of Christ

Have you ever heard about paper missionaries? A paper missionary utilizing gospel tracts is a way of sharing the gospel long after we are gone from this earth! It is just a paper that can be passed along, but can be used over and over again. I believe that "passing out tracts" or "dropping tracts" should not be a substitute for soul winning, but it is still a very important part of sharing the gospel to the lost. Did you know that if all 30 members of our congregation would each put out just seven tracts per week, (one tract per day) in one month over 840 tracts would be passed along? In one year over 10,080 tracts would be distributed, and therefore at least 10,080 people would be touched by the word of God! If one person would be saved for every one thousand tracts, ten souls would be won to Christ during that year!

That's the value of gospel tracts. A tract is just a simple presentation of the gospel message; it is short, printed in convenient size, and designed for easy distribution and use. There is probably no easier, more convenient way to share the Good News of Jesus Christ than through the use of gospel tracts. Many people have been led to Christ by reading tracts that they have received. There was man in the Philippines, who became an elder of the church for quite a long time. He was converted into Christ through the help of his lovely wife. His loving wife, Mary, was the first one who obeyed the gospel through the tracts that were left on her door. At first, when she read the tract, she was very angry because the title of the tract was: Does Mary Remain a Virgin After Jesus was Born? So, she called the phone number of the Church of Christ and asked them to send someone to come to her house, her intention was to debate with the preacher of the Church - she was then a fanatic and a defender of Roman Catholic Church. Before the team of preachers arrived to her house, she had already prepared a page full of questions regarding the tract that she read.

Unfortunately, she was not able to ask those questions because every single verse from the tract was absolutely explained and expounded by the preacher very clearly. After the presentation, the preacher asked Mary, "Ma'am, do you have any question about the tract that you have read?" Mary said, "I have listed more than 50 questions on this paper, but I just want to ask you one thing...Will you refuse, if I ask you now to baptize me in the name of Jesus Christ?" Praise God! God used a simple tract so that this lady was connected into Christ. Since then, her husband, children and grand children became members of the Church because of her faith and obedience. Her late husband served the Church faithfully, and one of their sons is presently serving as one of the deacons of the Church of Christ in Baguio City!

The gospel tract is a link between a person and God. If we are truly burdened for those around us, we will look for ways to reach them for Christ. It is important to be ready to share the gospel any time we are in contact with people. Christians who are not preachers can pass out tracts. It is EASY to do. If members were to lack a tongue entirely, they could still spread the gospel by means of tracts. Gospel tracts can be left anywhere or shared with almost anyone. They can be distributed by all of us, regardless of age, race, or education, for every need, and for every type of person. Tracts provide an easy way to "break the ice" or "open the door" for soul winning. The message, since it is printed, can be taken home, re-read and studied. Tracts can be mass distributed easily, and they are inexpensive and can be handed out liberally.

Success in preaching the gospel depends on the power of the Holy Spirit and how we have presented the word of God to people. If a person refused to have a personal Bible study with you, how can he believe if he will not hear the word of God? Romans 10:17 says, "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God." If a person refused to have a personal Bible study with you but accepted the tract that you give out, there is a big possibility that that person will believe the word of God because he reads and understands the message of the gospel written in that tract! Yes, let us look for opportunities to use tracts. Let us take advantage of every situation. Do not become discouraged if you see few responses at first. Remember, "So shall My Word be that goeth forth out of My mouth: it shall not return unto Me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." (Isaiah 55:11). "And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." (Galatians 6:9). "One soweth, and another reapeth." (John 4:37). Distribute tracts plentifully and persistently and you will see the result of it. "He who soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." (2 Corinthians 9:6).

The goal of gospel tracts ministry is to reach as many people as possible with the gospel, for "... repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His Name among all nations..." (Luke 24:47). Many who would never attend church nor open the BIBLE, will in fact, read a tract. They will thereby hear the Word of God, and many will be saved. Give tracts to friends and acquaintances everywhere. Give to strangers in restaurants and grocery stores, bag boys and gas station (Continued on next page)

Four workers from Fraser International brought the container of tracts from Cape Town. One of them was lying on top of the boxes during the 30 mile ride praying for God to reveal His will to him. In Memory of Jessie Lee Caskey



Jessie Lee Caskey, 92, passed away September 26, 2012. She was born on January 21, 1920 in Camden, TX. She and her husband, Guy Caskey, have two children: David Caskey and his wife, Dinah, and Judy Tarver and her husband Cleo. She has seven grand-children, ten great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild. Her husband, Guy, preceded her in death in 2003. Her funeral was conducted on September 29 at the North Davis Church of Christ in Arlington, TX. Interment followed at the Livelyville Cemetery in Grapeland, near Crockett, TX.

Guy began preaching the Gospel at the age of sixteen in Grapeland, TX, where his dad was an elder. A few years later, he and Jessie Lee met when Guy was holding a meeting in Highlands, TX, where she was living. A friend had invited Jessie Lee to attend the service. After a short courtship and her conversion, they were married and that marriage lasted "until death do us part."

After several years of preaching in Dalhart, TX, Pampa, TX, and Fort Worth, TX, they left in 1949 to go to South Africa. This was a difficult decision in many ways because it was taking their family a long way from home, and was an especially

difficult decision for Jessie Lee as she was leaving her single mother, knowing she would not see or talk to her for five years, and not knowing what kind of home they would have for their children. In 1954 they returned to the states to live in Sweetwater, TX, where Guy preached for the Lamar Street congregation. This was so that David could finish High School before they returned to Africa once again.

The next mission work was in East Africa, beginning in 1957 and lasted about four years. David returned to the states to attend Abilene Christian College, and she did not see him for three and one-half years. The family lived quite comfortably in South Africa, and the schools were good according to British Standards. However, living in East Africa was another story. They lived in a remote area above the Great North Road on a mountain at 7,300 feet. There was no running water in the home at first, but later that was established which made it much better. There was no electricity except for a generator which provided temporary power.

There were many long, lonely days, but Jessie Lee filled her days with taking care of the books for the school, picking food daily from the garden and cooking on a wood burning stove. She taught many classes to the students' wives and the village women. She taught and brought many to Christ. In addition, she provided medical aid to students and village people. During these days, she became an adept hunter to kill game for food. She took lessons and became a pilot before going to East Africa in case they ever had that need.

After returning from Africa in late 1960, they once again lived in Sweetwater, TX where Guy preached for two and one-half years and then returned to Pampa, TX in 1963 to fill the pulpit there. It was from there they decided to go to Jamaica where Guy was the Director of the Jamaica School of Preaching, beginning in 1969. This was another adjustment for Jessie Lee, but one she filled as beautifully as she had in Africa. In 1974 they returned to the states where Guy became the pulpit minister of the Randol Mill Church of Christ in Arlington, TX.

Jessie Lee sacrificed a great deal in her life and lived without many of the pleasures and comforts most enjoy in the U.S., but she did it gladly because she was just as committed to Guy's work as he was. She never complained or felt sorry for herself. She truly lived a life of dignity and, she died with dignity. Jessie Lee was greatly loved and admired by many the world over, and she probably never really knew or realized it.

Through all the many years of their marriage, Jessie Lee was devoted to her husband and a faithful servant of the Lord. There were many hardships encountered during those years, living in undeveloped countries as compared to the luxuries of the United States. However, Jessie Lee was a strong and determined woman who made the best of difficult situations. It takes a special woman to be a preacher's wife and a missionary's wife, and Jessie Lee filled that role well.

During the years of mission work, Guy and Jessie Lee saw the need for providing free gospel literature to people in developing nations. Their vision of sending the gospel message into all the world by the printed page eventually resulted in the founding of Mission Printing. The work originally began in two large rooms added on to their home in Arlington, while Guy was serving as pulpit minister of the Randol Mill Church of Christ in the late 1970's. The work quickly grew and moved into the present facility in 1987. Guy retired from his full time pulpit ministry in 1982 and became director of Mission Printing. Guy did extensive writing on various scriptural topics and made many presentations promoting Mission Printing and raising funds. He devoted full time to Mission Printing for many years until he became ill in 2002. During all this time Jessie Lee was working at Mission Printing, supporting Guy in all that he did. She continued to work at Mission Printing after Guy's death until she became ill about two years ago. Jessie Lee was an invaluable asset to Mission Printing, and she will be dearly missed.

Mission Printing News 2012 - 2013

- Container Shipments During 2012 we shipped three sea containers. Each container holds about 750,000 tracts and were delivered to: Abeokuta, Nigeria, Accra, Ghana, and Cape Town, South Africa. We plan another shipment in February 2013.
- Financial Improvements Our financial condition showed some improvement in 2012 with a slight increase of our regular donations and a few large extraordinary gifts - one in common stock, the others in cash. We thank and appreciate all our donors for their support.
- Paper Purchases In 2012 we began purchasing our roll paper by the truck load to save money. Buying more than 100 rolls at a time results in significant savings. Our supplier warehouses this stock at no cost to us until we order it delivered to our facility. This paper is higher quality than what we were getting before. Essentially, this enables us to print more for the same cost.
- Facility Maintenance During the hot summer of 2012 one of our three A/C units failed and had to be replaced. These units are estimated to be about 35 years old. We were a little warm on one side of the building for a while until the new unit was installed at a cost of over \$8,000.00.
- New Volunteers Over the last year we have been blessed with several new volunteers who have become regular workers with us at our facility. These fine folks are helping us in all phases of our processes of printing and production of our publications. We are totally dependent on our volunteer workforce, without which our mission could not be accomplished.
- New Congregations Workstations Several congregations have Mission Printing workstations at their church buildings (see page 8). They pick up the material at our building and take it to their location where they collate and staple the tracts. When completed, they bring it back and we trim and box the tracts for shipment. Within the past year we had five new congregations set up workstations. They are: Breckenridge Church of Christ (Breckenridge, TX), Bridgewood Church of Christ (Fort Worth, TX), Burleson Church of Christ (Burleson, TX), Hawn Freeway Church of Christ (Dallas, TX), and Smithfield Church of Christ (Fort Worth, TX).
- Death In Our Family We have suffered several deaths in the Mission Printing family this past year. These volunteers and supporters will be greatly missed: Art Bell, Nana Bolton, Jessie Lee Caskey, Morris Guthrie, Jess Lewellyn, Mary Sarratt, Fran Snider Weatherford and Stewart Whittington.
- Richard Renfro Richard embarked on a 20 day trip to West Africa on January 9, 2013. He will be visiting missionaries and our volunteer distribution managers in Liberia, Ghana and Togo. Please pray for a successful trip and a safe return.
